Developing oral skills

1. Read to children frequently – even older ones – from a variety of texts. Do not neglect poetry as rhyme is an important skill in developing oral language.





2. Teach vocabulary explicitly. Talk about what a word looks like/ rhymes with/ the number of syllables within the word/ what it means and how it would be used in a sentence.

- 3. Provide speaking frames to develop confidence in oral language.

- 4. Make time and plan for children to talk to each other formally and informally. Set up role plays areas even for older children. Link the area to topics being covered in class (French café, World War I trenches, science labs etc).
